MARCH 3 St Andrew's Church 7.30 pm - 10 pm **£ B** Festival Launch - a literary themed variety show

This opening event brings you a literary themed variety show which reflects the programme for the Festival in its diverse interpretation of the concept of literature.

Actor **Christopher Biggins** will welcome you and talk all things literary including an overview of forthcoming Festival events.

This is followed by a welcome return of BAFTA-nominated filmmaker **Jack Jewers** who will be screening the second of his inVerse series. Series two focuses on bold and radical interpretations of Shakespeare's work to mark 400 years since the first publication of his plays.

Next comes well-known local singer / songwriters Jim Cozens and Rebecca Jayne. They will give us a taste of their music and talk about their experiences of songwriting and the journey towards a great song. The evening ends with a talk from one of the Festival authors who will share their love of books and literature and explain how they started writing - and why they continued!

Author Sebastian Payne takes us inside the corridors of power and talks about his new book The Fall of Boris Johnson. This is the full narrative of the betrayals, rivalries and resignations that led to the dramatic Conservative coup.

Join local historian Roy Waight and academic Juanita Cox as they provide a fascinating insight into the life and work of Edgar Mittelholzer, both in Farnham and in the Caribbean. Born in 1909 in British Guyana, he was the first Member of the Caribbean literati to be awarded the Guggenheim Fellowship. His work is credited with signalling the birth of the Caribbean novel. Mittelholzer published 22 novels, between 1941 and 1965.



WRITING WORKSHOP






MARCH 9 Farnham Maltings 7 pm - 8:30 pm The National Theatre Live - Othello







If you do not have access to the internet, the reception staff at Farnham Town Council in South Street will be happy to help you.

Seats are not allocated for most events. On arrival at most venues, your name will be checked against an attendance list but you may also need to show your confirmation email.

Books will be available to purchase at most author events.



Farnham Literary Festival's Schools Programme

Literacy statistics in the UK are quite startling, with 413,000 children reportedly not owning a single book, while 1 in 5 school age children in the UK struggle to read and write.

However, reports have found that pupils who had an author visit this academic year:

- Were twice as likely to read above the expected level for their age.
- Are more likely to enjoy reading and writing.
- Are more likely to be highly confident in their reading and writing.

Farnham Town Council is dedicated to helping improve literacy for all children in local schools. With the help of The Blue Bear Bookshop and The Farnham Literary Festival, is honoured to be able to provide both local and bestselling authors to inspire the students of our schools in Farnham.




